You don't need to be a respiratory therapist to order and anyone can show their support!

How to Pre-Commit:

2. Navigate to: "Reserve a Pre-commitment Plate" towards the center bottom of the page

By pre-committing to this custom plate, you'll help us reach our goal of 250 plates, which is the number of orders required to make this design a reality. Once we meet our goal, your custom plate will be produced and shipped to you.


